## AN ACT

## CREATING A TRIPARTITE COUNCIL TO ADDRESS UNEMPLOYMENT, UNDEREMPLOYMENT, AND THE JOB-SKILLS MISMATCH PROBLEM IN THE COUNTRY, AND APPROPRIATING FUNDS THEREFOR

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Philippines in Congress assembled:

**SECTION 1.** *Declaration of Policy.* – It is declared the policy of the State to promote the sustained development of a skilled citizenry and maintain a reservoir of national talents consisting of Filipino scientists, entrepreneurs, professionals, managers, high-level technical manpower, and skilled workers and craftsmen in all fields. Skills development can reduce unemployment and underemployment, increase productivity, and improve the standards of living.

8 To this end, the State shall ensure the relevance and adequacy of academic courses in 9 the higher education curriculum and training programs offered in technical-vocational 10 institutions in relation to the needs and requirements of the business and industry sectors and 11 the over-all human resource requirement of the country pursuant to its economic development 12 goals.

14 SEC. 2. Creation of a Tripartite Council. - There is hereby established a Tripartite 15 Council, hereinafter referred to as the Council, that shall formulate policies and programs to address the job-skills mismatch in the country. It shall be a coordinating body among the 16 government, academe and industry sectors to primarily monitor economic trends in the global 17 and domestic markets, including those pertaining to business and commerce and the local labor 18 generate information relative and to to employment, 19 market. unemployment. underemployment, and job-skills mismatch. The Council shall be made up of representatives 20 from the government, academe, and industry. 21

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The government representatives shall be composed of the following: a Commissioner of the Commission on Higher Education (CHED); a Deputy Director-General of the Technical Education and Skills Development Authority (TESDA); an Undersecretary of the Department of Education (DepEd); an Undersecretary of the Department of Labor and Employment (DOLE); and an Undersecretary of the Department of Trade and Industry (DTI).

The representatives of the academe shall be the presidents of the federations of public 29 and private higher education institutions (HEIs), public and private technical-vocational 30 institutions (TVIs), and accreditation bodies of higher and technical-vocational educational 31 institutions, which include the following: Philippine Association of State Universities and 32 Colleges; Association of Local Colleges and Universities; Coordinating Council of Private 33 Educational Associations; Technical-Vocational Schools and Associations of the Philippines; 34 National Network of Quality Assurance Agencies; and the Federation of Accrediting Agencies 35 of the Philippines. 36

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The representatives of the industry sector shall be the presidents of the following business and industry federations: Employers Confederation of the Philippines; Makati Business Club; Semiconductor and Electronics Industries in the Philippines Foundation, Incorporated; Information Technology and Business Process Association of the Philippines;

15 16 17	specifi	<b>SEC. 3.</b> <i>Powers and Functions of the Council.</i> – The Council shall have the following c powers and functions:
18 19 20 21	a)	Monitor the trends in the labor market, both domestic and international, and the incidence of unemployment, underemployment and the job-skills mismatch problem in the country;
22 23 24	b)	Formulate short-term and long-term policies, plans and programs that shall address job- skills mismatch, unemployment, and underemployment;
25 26 27	c)	Conduct an inventory, review and evaluation of courses, academic programs and curricula of public and private HEIs and training programs implemented by TVIs;
28 29 30 31 32 33 34	d)	Conduct an assessment of qualifications, skills and competencies of students and graduates of higher education courses and technical-vocational education and training and benchmark these with national and international standards such as the Philippine Qualifications Framework, Association of Southeast Asian Nations Qualifications Reference Framework, other frameworks, and international agreements to which the Philippines is a signatory;
35 36	e)	Conduct an inventory of job specifications and skills requirement of various industries;
37 38 39 40	f)	Recommend to the President of the Philippines, Congress and other government institutions policy measures that need to be undertaken in addressing the problems of unemployment, underemployment and job-skills mismatch;
41 42	g)	Hold regular quarterly meetings; and

46 47	shall s	<b>SEC. 4.</b> <i>Annual Report and Assessment.</i> – Upon the effectivity of this Act, the Council ubmit an annual report to Congress on the status of employment of college students and

- new graduates for the last five years, as well as an assessment of the trends in the labor market
  and the skills required by various industries and business establishments.
- SEC. 5. Appropriations. The amount necessary for the implementation of this Act 3 shall be included in the annual General Appropriations Act. 4 5 SEC. 6. Implementing Rules and Regulations. - Within ninety (90) days after the 6 7 effectivity of this Act, the CHED shall, in coordination with the TESDA, DepEd, DTI and DOLE, as well as other education stakeholders, issue the rules and regulations for the effective 8 implementation of this Act. 9 10 SEC. 7. Separability Clause. - If, for any reason, any portion or provision of this Act 11 shall be held unconstitutional or invalid, the remaining provisions not affected thereby shall 12 continue to be in full force and effect. 13 14 SEC. 8. Repealing Clause. - All laws, presidential decrees, executive orders, rules and 15 regulations, issuances or parts thereof, which are inconsistent with the provisions of this Act, 16 are hereby repealed, amended or modified accordingly. 17
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  19 SEC. 9. *Effectivity.* This Act shall take effect fifteen (15) days after its publication
  20 in the *Official Gazette* or in a newspaper of general circulation.
